

Background



The Solid Waste Trust Fund (SWTF) is funded by the Tire Management Fee through the sale of new tires in Georgia.



In November 2020, Georgia voters approved a constitutional amendment authorizing the Georgia Legislature to dedicate fee revenue directly to the purpose for which the fees were imposed.



This newly dedicated funding allowed EPD to create and administer grants from the SWTF.



The Recycling and Waste Diversion and Tire Products Grants were created as part of the SWTF Grant Program.

SWTF Grants

Tire Products (Tire)

- Reduce solid waste

 Clean up scrap tires through collection (amnesty) events, rights-of-way, and local government led abatement (tire dumps)

Metrics

As of April 15, 2025...

Awarded RWD Grant projects have diverted over **1,800 tons** of materials from Georgia's landfills. This includes:

- 429 tons of plastic
- 256 tons of cardboard/paper
- 109 tons of glass
- 40 tons of household hazardous waste
- 41 tons of hard-to-recycle materials
- 759 tons of organics that were then composted

The Tire Grant has awarded:

- 12 pour-in-place playground or sports field projects
- 6 roadway/paving projects
- 3 pour-in-place walkway projects
- 1 research project

These projects have utilized **73 tons** of tire-derived products, which is equivalent to **6,500 passenger** tires.

Tire Products Grant









Tire-derived Products Track

- Projects that utilize TDP instead of conventional or virgin materials
- No match required for this track
- Grant funds will only pay for the difference in price for the direct cost of incorporating the TDP
- Direct cost may include material costs, or specialized services, such as the mixing of TDP

Grant funds only pay for the difference in price between the direct cost of incorporating TDP and conventional materials

- •In the application, you will demonstrate the cost of conventional materials. This could include:
 - •Labor, including staff time (estimate the hourly rate and number of hours)
 - Materials
- •You will also demonstrate the cost of the TDP and associated services. This could include:
 - •Labor, including staff time
 - •TDP materials
 - •Non-TDP materials, including necessary bonding agents, stone underlay...but you will need to demonstrate while these are needed
 - Freight/shipping and handling
 - •Installation services

For Example...

You are applying for a playground renovation. The existing playground surfacing consists of wood mulch. The wood mulch needs to be removed before new mulch is installed. This costs \$5,420 (\$3,000 for the mulch, \$500 for delivery, and \$1,920 for staff labor). For staff labor, you estimate that it will take 2 individuals at \$30/hr., and that it will take 4 full, 8-hour days (2 staff X \$30/hr. X 32 hrs. = \$1,920).

It costs \$120,000 to have the playground resurfaced with pour-in-place TDP. This includes \$85,000 for the TDP materials, \$5,000 freight, and \$30,000 installation fees.

The difference in cost, and the amount eligible for award, is \$114,580.

TDP – conventional = grant award amount

\$120,000 - \$5,420 = \$114,580

Ineligible Tire-derived Products Projects

- Studies have raised concerned with the environmental and public health impacts associated with loose tire-derived mulch and tire-derived beads
- As a result, EPD will <u>NOT</u> fund projects utilizing loose tire-derived mulch or tire-derived beads for artificial turf





Tire-Derived Product Project Examples

Research of New and/or Innovative Uses Track

- Projects that seek to identify innovative uses
- Conduct research, tests, or develop beneficial uses for products derived from scrap tires
- Awarded grant funds may be used for all costs related to research, such as material testing
- A minimum 20% match of the total project cost is required



Recycling and Waste Diversion Grant

The RWD Grant allows eligible applicants to develop project proposals that best support their communities' needs. Projects must focus on increasing recycling, reducing waste, and/or diverting recoverable materials from the solid waste stream.









Recycling and Waste Diversion Infrastructure

Projects that create, expand, or improve infrastructure at:

- Materials recovery facilities (MRF)
- Recycling transfer stations
- Convenience centers

May range from construction to the purchase of equipment that will increase the capacity to serve customers



Improving community access to recycling

- First-time recycling access for a community
- Curbside or community collection bins







Collection Events

- Hard-to-recycle materials (paint, batteries, household chemicals, electronics, plastic film, etc.)
- E-recycling

Recovery of Additional Materials

Projects that collect and/or process new material streams

Waste Reduction

• Projects that create, expand, or improve programs at the local level to reduce waste.





Innovation

Projects that demonstrate innovative processes for waste reduction or innovative use of recycled products.



RWD Project Metrics




The required metric of RWD Projects is weight or volume of material diverted or recycled.

Project narratives should:

- Describe how the project will directly result in a measurable amount of waste diverted from landfills or recycled
- Demonstrate how the weight or volume of material diverted or recycled will be quantified

RWD Optional Metrics

Applicants may also consider including secondary metrics:



- Number of residents with first-time access to recycling
- Volunteer hours
- Community participation rates in collection events or at recycling facilities
- Community behavior changes (decrease in contamination rate, increased use of collection bins, social media engagement, survey data, etc.)

Projects that do not demonstrate cost-effectiveness



Projects in which the *primary* activity and use of grant funds is for activities not directly associated with recycling and diversion



Projects that focus on operational efficiency or improvements rather than recycling or diversion outcomes



Pilot projects without sufficient cost-effective justification and longevity metrics


Ineligible RWD and Tire Project Examples

- Projects in which the primary activity is education.
- Projects that seek reimbursement for completed activities prior to the execution of RWD or Tire Grant award agreement.
- Projects regarding improvements for landfill capacity or any landfill activities that do not include recycling or diversion.
- Projects that are in violation of the Georgia Comprehensive Solid Waste Management Act and the Rules and Regulations of the State of Georgia.

Example: Project that proposes to divert material from the landfill that is banned from landfill disposal.

Eligibility, Funding, and Timeline





Eligibility

- Counties and municipalities
- Public authorities, agencies, commissions, or institutions
- Department of Community Affairs compliant



Ineligibility

- Nonprofit or private organizations
 Applicants may partner or contract with nonprofits or private organizations.
- Applicants who are subject to an open EPD consent order or other EPD enforcement action.
- Applicants who have a noncompliance status with the DCA
- Applicants who have received grant funds in past years but have NOT demonstrated successful administration of those grant funds.

Previous Applicants

- Projects not selected in one grant cycle may be resubmitted in subsequent grant cycles.
- Awardees from previous RWD and Tire Grant cycles are eligible to apply <u>if</u> they have completed the terms of their awarded agreement.
 - Awardees from previous RWD and Tire Grant Cycles <u>may not</u> extend or modify their current agreements
- Awardees from previous RWD Grant cycles <u>may not</u> resubmit for the same project as they were originally awarded

Available Funding

- Grants will be awarded each fiscal year (July 1 June 30).
- Applicants may apply up to the budget amount set aside for each grant, subject to any caps.
- Grant funds are paid out on a reimbursement basis. If you require advanced funds, provide a justification narrative.







- Applicants may only submit one application per grant per grant cycle








✓ Which vendors is my organization eligible to work with?

Your organization will most likely have protocol for procurement. For example, services over a certain dollar amount may require bids.

There may be some services that your organization already has a pool of qualified vendors that you must use.

The SWTF Grant Program does not specify procurement protocol. Rather, it is left to each applicant to follow their organization's established procurement methods.



For example...

Your organization has contacted a company to supply a quote for tire-derived rubberized asphalt to submit as supporting material for the Tire Grant application. Your project is then awarded. You must then follow your organization's procurement policies to hire a vendor to perform this service.


If there is a vendor you would like to use, it is your responsibility to ensure that the vendor is eligible to do business with your organization.





Match

- A minimum 20% match of the total project cost is required for the Tire Grant - Research Track only.
- Applicants of the RWD Grant and Tire Grant – Products Track may include a match to supplement project costs.
- A match is a cash or in-kind resource commitment beyond the grant dollar amount requested.
- Match items should be documented through letters of commitment, copies of checks, payroll records, etc.







A Final Report must be submitted at the end of the project that includes a summary of the project and metrics quantifying the project's success.




Invoicing

Recipients must submit a
Reimbursement Request Form to EPD
along with invoices and proof of payment
for grant spending.

Reimbursement Request Forms may be submitted once every 30 days.

Evaluation and Scoring





Scoring

- Applications will be reviewed by EPD to determine if the applicant and proposed project are eligible
- Eligible projects will be scored according the evaluation criteria
- EPD will fund projects starting with the highest-ranking score first and will continue awarding funds until all funds have been exhausted
- If a grant application is approved for award, EPD will notify the applicant and provide an agreement for signature
- Both project types total the same amount of points
 75 base with 10 bonus points, for 85 total points


