Project Summary

The Climate Pollution Reduction Grants (CPRG) program will provide grants to states, local governments, tribes, and territories to develop and implement plans for reducing greenhouse gas emissions and other harmful air pollution. Section 60114 of the Inflation Reduction Act provides an investment of \$5 billion to support efforts by states, municipalities, air pollution control agencies, tribes, and groups thereof to develop and implement strong, local greenhouse gas reduction strategies. This two-staged grant program provides funding of \$250 million for noncompetitive planning grants, and \$4.6 billion for competitive implementation grants.

The funds awarded under this grant will serve to support activities in the Georgia Environmental Protection Division (Georgia EPD) Air Protection Branch. Georgia EPD is planning a multifaceted approach to developing and implementing a plan to reduce greenhouse gas (GHGs) emissions and other harmful air pollutants in Georgia. This approach includes developing a GHG emission inventory, improving our understanding of harmful air pollution, and utilizing a stakeholder engagement process to develop a plan that prioritizes actions to reduce emissions of harmful air pollution while incentivizing the growth of Georgia's clean energy economy. The following narrative gives details to the extent known on these topics.

Roles and Responsibilities

Georgia EPD has a wealth of knowledge and experience in air quality and planning. Georgia EPD has an established air quality program as a State Implementation Plan (SIP) approved state.

Dr. James Boylan has a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from the University of Notre Dame, M.S. in Chemical Engineering from Auburn University, and M.S. and Ph.D. in Environmental Engineering from Georgia Tech. He worked in the Planning & Support Program for 19 years, served as the Assistant Branch Chief for one and a half years, and now serves as the Branch Chief of the Air Protection Branch in Georgia EPD.

Mr. Steve Allison has a B.S. and M.S. in Chemical Engineering from Auburn University and serves as manager of the Planning and Support Program which includes the Planning and Regulatory Development Unit (PRDU), Data and Modeling Unit (DMU), and the Emissions and Control Strategies Unit (ECSU). The Planning and Support Program is responsible for rule-making, planning, modeling, emissions inventory development, and other programs that improve Georgia's air quality.

Ms. Anna Aponte has a B.S. in Chemical Engineering from Georgia Tech and serves as manger of the Planning and Regulatory Development Unit. She has worked in Planning and Support for two years and has over 13 years of experience in stationary source permitting. She will be overseeing the activities associated with this grant and all personnel.

Georgia EPD has appropriate mechanisms in place to ensure that the expenditures associated with this grant proposal are tracked and documented, including personnel costs, through the EPD Director of Finance, Ms. Erin Ruoff.

State Requirements/Plan

In addition to the deliverables listed in the "Deliverables" section, Georgia EPD will be completing the following tasks as part of the planning portion of the CPRG.

Develop a Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emissions Inventory:

This can include but is not limited to using contractors, hiring new staff, creating websites and mechanisms to collect the data, stakeholder meetings, and using existing data to begin the data collection process. Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) will be developed, similar to our existing SOP for criteria air pollutants emissions inventory data, to ensure the best quality of data is being collected.

Develop a plan to reduce GHG emissions throughout the state:

Using the data collected as a part of the GHG inventory, Georgia EPD will develop a plan to reduce GHG emissions in Georgia. Low-income and disadvantaged communities are often located near industrial areas, along interstates, and in areas that are disproportionally impacted by harmful air pollutants. Georgia EPD will develop a stakeholder outreach program. This program will create a

plan that reaches communities that are disproportionally impacted by harmful air pollutants. Coordination with organizations that are already working in these communities to develop appropriate outreach approaches will be a key component to ensure meaningful engagement throughout Georgia.

Coordination with state and local groups:

Georgia EPD has already identified a number of local municipalities that have already developed climate plans. Non-government organizations in Georgia are developing innovative ways to address harmful air pollutants. Georgia EPD plans to incorporate components of these existing plans that would reduce emissions of harmful air pollutants. Coordination will be the key to success for implementing these ideas and plans.

Georgia EPD will work very closely with the Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC) as they are the lead agency organization that is developing the climate pollution reduction plan for the Atlanta metro area.

Electric Vehicles:

In 2021, Governor Brian Kemp announced a statewide initiative to make Georgia the "electric mobility capital of America"¹². Since 2020, more than 35 electric vehicle (EV) related projects have announced more than \$21 billion in investment and 27,400 jobs in Georgia³. The stakeholder process for development of Georgia's Climate Pollution Reduction Plan will seek input on leveraging the work being done in Georgia to improve electric mobility infrastructure that would reduce harmful air pollution.

Hydrogen fuel corridor:

With multiple electric car manufacturers coming to Georgia, some Georgia stakeholders have expressed an interest in a hydrogen fuel corridor for the large volume of trucks that travel between Georgia's manufacturing plants and the Port of Savannah. The stakeholder process for development of Georgia's Climate Pollution Reduction Plan will seek input on the hydrogen fuel corridor's role in reducing emissions of harmful air pollutants.

Coordination with stakeholders on projects:

Georgia EPD plans to work with stakeholders to determine any additional projects that can provide a benefit to GHG emission reductions that are already being planned or developed.

Stakeholder Process

Georgia EPD has extensive experience with stakeholder engagement and public participation. The Planning & Support Program coordinates all SIP updates and revisions to the Georgia Rules for Air Quality Control. Both processes require public participation, including stakeholder meetings and public hearings. Georgia EPD will develop an engagement plan on how best to educate and involve our stakeholders throughout the state. This plan may involve and include the development of a climate advisory group that can consist of government and industry representatives. Also, Georgia EPD will utilize Climate Innovative Teams for training opportunities and to have interaction with peer and EPA to ensure success of the climate plans. Identifying and seeking input from communities that are disproportionately impacted by harmful air pollution will be an integral part of the stakeholder engagement process.

Over the years, Georgia EPD has updated their procedures to include virtual meetings and hearings that are conducted over Zoom. Zoom is a free web conferencing platform that allows participation by computer or phone. The number of people that are able to participate has grown, which has resulted in more meaningful engagement with the public on important topics. For the CPRG grant, Georgia EPD will continue to utilize virtual public meetings but will also explore offering in-person meetings in areas where it is warranted.

Georgia EPD will evaluate using existing organizations that already have relationships with communities to help foster good communication. Georgia EPD will seek to coordinate with organizations serving low-income and disadvantaged communities throughout Georgia. Translators will be utilized, including close captioning for the hearing-impaired, as needed. Services provided will be adapted based on the needs of the public with the goal of having the materials accessible to all.

Georgia EPD uses the platform called GovDelivery for email distribution lists for public notices, rule updates, and stakeholder meetings. Georgia EPD plans to continue using this platform and will send out a press release to inform the public on the stakeholder process and how to be notified for all CPRG meetings and activities.

The list of stakeholders will continue to grow as more agencies, companies, and organizations express interest. Georgia EPD intends to work closely with a variety of groups, including but not limited to state agencies, local and city governments, utilities, manufacturing plants, energy efficiency organizations, sustainability advocates, and environmental groups. Other interested stakeholders will be identified as we go through this process.

Environmental Justice Impacts

The GHG emissions inventory planned as part of the CPRG program creates an opportunity for regulatory agencies to identify communities overburdened by pollution and install meaningful involvement opportunities. EPD intends to use the data collected as part of the emissions inventory to identify sources of pollution and determine areas in Georgia which are disproportionately affected by the environmental consequences. With this knowledge, EPD will take steps to create meaningful connections with organizations and community groups in those areas and seek involvement in the decision-making process to promote environmental justice. The increased opportunity for participation will help facilitate trust and continued positive relationships between regulatory agencies and the communities.

Deliverables

Key Deliverable #1: Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP)

The initial deliverable is a Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP), a narrative report due on March 1, 2024, that includes a focused list of near-term, high-priority, implementation ready measures to reduce GHG pollution and an analysis of GHG emissions reductions that would be achieved through implementation. These initial plans can focus on a specific sector or selected sectors, and do not need to comprehensively address all sources of GHG emissions and sinks in the jurisdiction. The PCAP must include:

- A GHG inventory;
- Quantified GHG reduction measures;
- A low-income and disadvantaged communities benefits analysis; and,
- A review of authority to implement.

Planning grant recipients are encouraged, but not required, to include additional analyses in their PCAP such as GHG emissions projections, GHG reduction targets, a benefits analysis (for the full geographic scope and population covered by the plan), a plan for leveraging other federal funding, and a workforce planning analysis. A PCAP may draw from or

reference an existing climate action plan or plans for the geographic area covered, such as an existing state climate, energy, or sustainability plan.

Key Deliverable #2: Comprehensive Climate Action Plan (CCAP)

The second deliverable is a Comprehensive Climate Action Plan (CCAP) due 2 years from the date of award of the planning grant. The CCAP should touch on all significant GHG sources/sinks and sectors present in a state or metropolitan area, establish near-term and long-term GHG emission reduction goals, and provide strategies and identify measures to achieve those goals. Each CCAP must include:

- A GHG inventory;
- GHG emissions projections;
- GHG reduction targets;
- Quantified GHG reduction measures;
- A benefits analysis for the full geographic scope and population covered by the plan;
- A low-income and disadvantaged communities benefits analysis;
- A review of authority to implement;
- A plan to leverage other federal funding; and,
- A workforce planning analysis.

Key Deliverable #3: Status Report

The third deliverable for states, municipalities, and air pollution control agencies is a Status Report due at the end of the 4-year planning grant period. This report should include:

- The implementation status of the quantified GHG reduction measures included in the CCAP;
- Any relevant updated analyses or projections supporting CCAP implementation; and,
- Next steps and future budget/staffing needs to continue CCAP implementation.

Planning grant recipients are encouraged to include updates to emissions analyses, GHG reduction measures, or other items as needed to reflect recent and forecasted changes in programs and emissions at the time the Status Report is prepared.
